River rescuer wants peace for survivor, recognition for her mate, anonymity for himself

ason Oglesbee isn't big on curtain calls. If that wasn't apparent after the river rescue seen around the world a month ago, it was perfectly clear before, during and after Monday's award ceremony at Des Moines City Hall.

The presentation lasted about 15 minutes. Mayor Frank Cownie led things off. A group of firefighters stood nearby as Fire Chief John TeKippe praised the heroic actions of Cramer & Associates construction workers Oglesbee, Joe Lowe and their supervisor, Chad Coalbank.

"June 30th," TeKippe said before handing out certificates of appreciation, "was a day of tragedy, heroism and tragedy
